

The USAID Regional Health Integration to Enhance Services in South-West Uganda Project (RHITES-SW) aims to enhance integrated HIV service delivery in the aforementioned region. Activities under the RHITES-SW project serve to increase the availability, accessibility, and quality of integrated health services including HIV prevention, care, and treatment, TB, maternal, neonatal and child health (MNCH), family planning, and other primary care services for Ugandans in 16 districts in the South West (SW).

HIV Prevention

- Reached 2,918,986 people with HIV testing services, including 590,536 pregnant women and 24,879 HIV-exposed infants
- Provided HIV prevention services to over 110,500 key and priority populations; placing 2,521 on treatment as prevention (pre-exposure prophylaxis)
 - Reached 189,868 men with VMMC



Prevention of Mother-to-Child HIV Transmission (PMTCT)

- Reached 476,540 pregnant and lactating women with PMTCT services
- Created access to ART for PMTCT among 29,029 HIVpositive, pregnant and lactating women
 - Averted 33,953 HIV infections



HIV Care and Treatment

- 62,525 people initiated on antiretroviral therapy (ART), including 1,619 children below age 15
 - Approximately 91% of all people on ART through supported sites have attained viral load suppression



TE

 Identified and treated 13,554 TB cases, including those of 746 children below age 15



MNCH

- Provided antenatal care services to 441,928 pregnant women
- Fully immunized 249,933 children below age five



- Treated 1,470,017 people for malaria, including 221,429 children and 19,437 pregnant women
- Provided malaria long-lasting treated mosquito nets and presumptive treatment to 325,184 pregnant and lactating women
